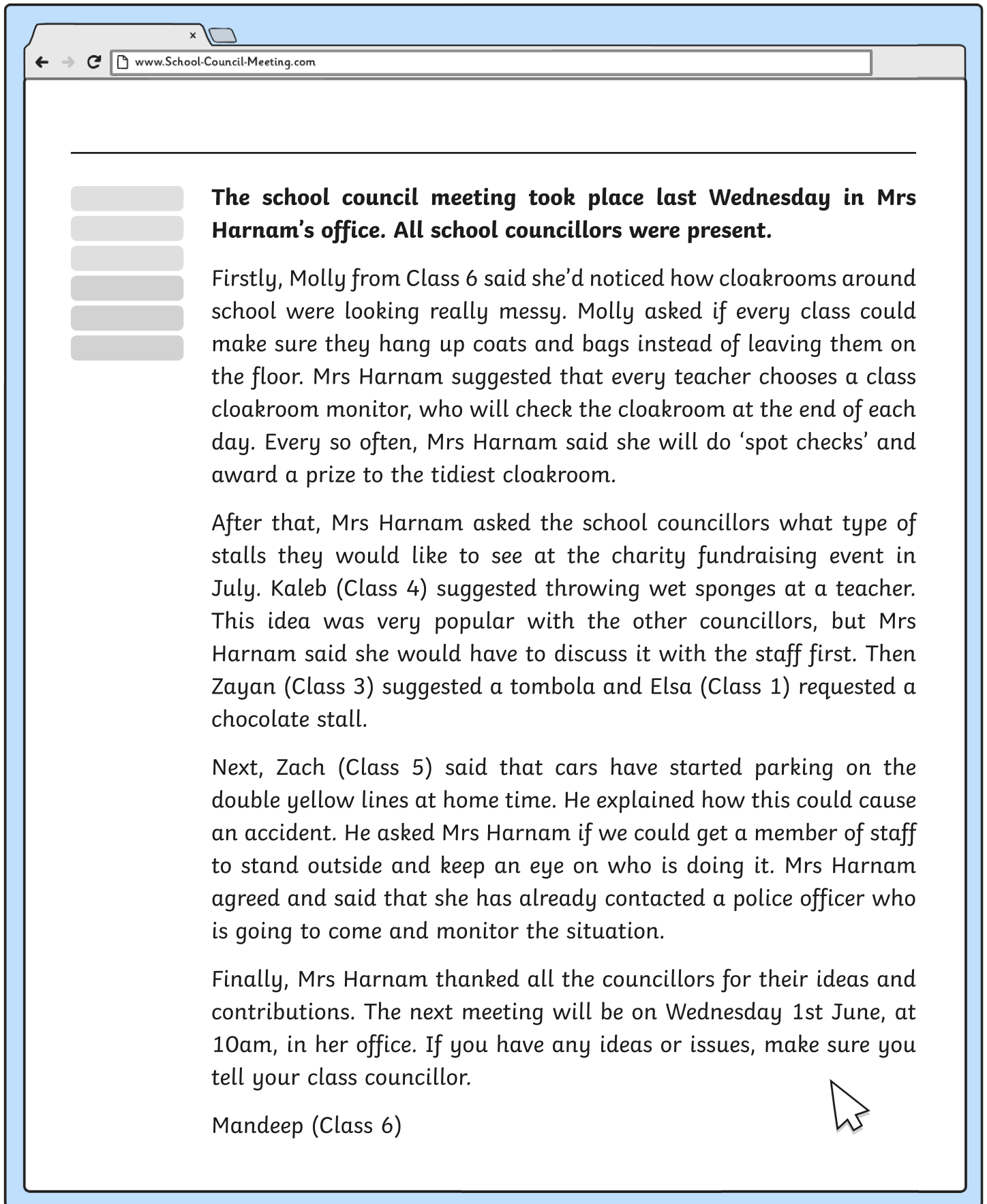


School Council Meeting
