The definition of a prophecy is a prediction of future events.

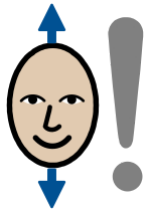


The Greek city-states formed a league who went to war with the Persian Empire.



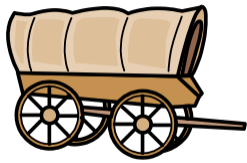
The murder of a public figure is called assassination.

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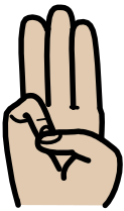
determined

One of the oldest modes of transportation is the wagon.



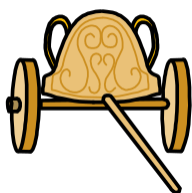
pledge

chariots

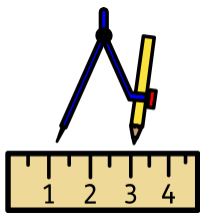
A chariot is a small carriage pulled by horses. In the ancient world, chariots were usually the fastest way to travel.
